

From the Office of the Pastor

Let me begin this newsletter with a note of gratitude for your thoughts, prayers, well wishes, cards and gifts for Debbie and I this Christmas. We are grateful for your support, and we cherish your love.

A little over a week from the time that I am writing this, our year will change from 2022 to 2023.



There are many ideas that we take for

granted. The concept and convention of the New Year is one of them. The New Year date is so widely accepted in our culture that most of us do not spend any time thinking about it. The truth is that although it is an accepted international convention to mark time in such a way, that the New Year always starts on January 1st and that the calendar year is split into twelve months, it is just a convention. Other things being equal, our calendar could just as easily have started on what we know as March 28, July 11, or any other day of the year. The day that we know as "January 1st" has a special significance in the Christian tradition. Since we traditionally celebrate the birth of Jesus on Christmas Eve (December 24), New Year's Day falls eight days from Christmas Eve.

In the book of Genesis 17:11-12 God made a covenant with Abraham, "You are to undergo circumcision, and it will be the sign of the covenant between me and you. For the generations to come every male among you who is **<u>eight</u>** days old must be circumcised"

In the book of Leviticus 12:3 we learn, "On the <u>eighth</u> day [after birth] the [newborn] boy is to be circumcised."

In the book of Luke 2:21 we read, "On the <u>eighth</u> day, when it was time to circumcise him, he was named Jesus [see Luke 1:31], the name the angel had given him before he had been conceived."

As an infant, Jesus (through the action of his parents) obeyed the command of the Law of Moses and was circumcised. By this act he began his submission to the Law of God, which he would keep in letter and spirit (Matthew 5:17) until he was crucified thirty-three years later.

During circumcision Jesus shed the first drop of his blood; thirtythree years later, on the Cross, he would shed all of his blood to establish the new covenant, and to redeem all of us into a new relationship with God. In Jesus' birth, God gave us a glimpse of possibilities and God's dreams and hopes for us. In Jesus' first act of obedience, God gave us an indication that when we are with God, all things are possible.

Celebration of the New Year is a time to reflect on where we have been and think about where we may be going. It is a time when the past and the future seem to be held simultaneously in a single, encompassing perspective.

As we shed an old habit and learn to write 2023 instead of 2022, I want to challenge all of us to be aware of the creative and visionary source within us that is rooted in the creative power of God. Our connection to God and to each other can be a source of potential and transformation, new birth, and new beginnings, available to each of us individually and to our community each moment of our lives. That connection to God makes each moment the beginning of the rest of our lives.

I pray that 2023 will be a year of growth and spiritual maturity for our faith and our congregation. Let us all be diligent and purposeful about bringing the Good News of the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the world in every way open to us, personally and communally.

May God Bless our St. Georges' United Methodist church; my prayer is that God's Spirit among us is a catalyst of positive change and growth in 2023.

Friday, April 7: Good Friday service.



Our Financial Position as of End of November 2022



YTD receipts for the Operating Budget at the end of November were \$111,614; expenditures were \$135,729. As of the end of November 2022, expenditures exceeded receipts, resulting in a deficit of \$24,178.

In addition to plate receipts, the church received \$37,259 in income from rental properties.


