


From the Office of the Pastor

Autumn is a time of change, and change can be difficult. As beautiful as the fall foliage is, it reminds us that the leaves are going to fall, trees will stand bare for the winter, and the days will get cold, wet, and grey.



What helps me to get through the seasons of autumn and winter is the realization that God

created the cycles and seasons of nature. While in the fall the leaves are getting ready to fall off the trees, we are blessed with a beautiful fusion of vivid colors. It is a reminder that although winter is coming, there is going to be renewal and regeneration on the other side.

In Psalm 23 there is a line, "though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death." The beauty of autumn foliage reminds me that though I have to journey THROUGH the dampness of a chilly winter, the light and warmth of spring is going to come. The trees will sprout new leaves and flowers, animals will get busy having and rearing

babies, and a new cycle of renewal and regeneration will be here soon.

In Ecclesiastes 3: 1-4 we hear, "To everything there is a season, a time for every purpose under heaven:

A time to be born, and a time to die;

A time to plant,

and a time to pluck what is planted;

... A time to break down,

and a time to build up...."

Every church must also live through cycles. Every church must take time to experience "the theological season of fall" when we intentionally reevaluate the direction of our congregational lives and ministry, when we rethink our ministries and outreach. Without such processes in place, we will outreach to populations in a way that was needed 10 or 20 years ago, instead of ministering in the way that is appropriate today or for the future.

In the metaphor of autumn foliage, the fallen leaves will blanket the ground, and release their nutrients back into the soil so that new seedlings can be nurtured in the spring. Ideally the fruit of St. Georges' United Methodist church ministries from 10 or 20 years ago sustains and fosters today's outreach. Today we strive to nurture

younger generations on their journey of emotional and spiritual growth and prepare to carry the message of the love of God into the future.



The reason this cartoon is humorous is because the characters are talking about "a journey of transformation," but they do not want to invest any energy into that journey. They fear transformation that requires "any real changes."

Outreach requires our engagement, it is that

simple. To be meaningful, outreach must also facilitate transformation in us, as well as in the people we outreach and minister to; otherwise we are just enabling the status quo.

I want to leave you with a few questions to think about:

- How do you facilitate emotional and spiritual growth in others?
- How do you enable others in their old habits and encourage them to stay stagnant? How do we stifle growth in others?

 How has this outreach renewed and continue to renew you personally? How does it renew our church – St. Georges United Methodist Church?

What Does It Mean to Me That Jesus Came to Dwell Among Us

"I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full" (John 10:10).

"You will know the truth, and the truth will set you free" (John 8:32).

On Christmas Eve Christendom celebrates Jesus' birth. By taking human form and being born of a human mother and nurtured by a human father and family, God in the person of Jesus took a drastic turn in God's relationship with humanity.

Being one of us, Jesus understands our human plight, emotions, and our fallenness. Living among us, the Holy Spirit helps us stay on the straight and narrow (Matthew 7:14) that leads us to God.

When was the last time that you complained that somebody changed all the questions just as you learned all the answers. When was the last time that you complained, "We've never done it this way?"

Loving and Gracious God! As you made a choice to be flexible, adaptable, and patient with humanity and even came to dwell among us in the person of Jesus, I pray that you help me to be flexible, adaptable, and patient, and to strive to understand my neighbors. Amen.

What Does It Mean to Me That Jesus Came to Dwell Among Us

a reflection by Asher (Example # 2).

"You are the light of the world (Matthew 5:14).

"I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing" (John 15:5).

Recently I was looking at a lamp that stands in the corner of our living room. For this lamp to provide light,

- Someone had to build an electric plant (hydro, nuclear, solar, or wind) to generate electricity.
- Someone else has to manage and maintain the plant that produces the electricity.
- Someone had to build power lines to bring the electricity from the plant to my apartment.
- Someone has to maintain and manage these power lines.
- Someone had to manufacture the lamp and the light bulb.
- Someone had to transport the lamp and the light bulb to the store where I bought them.

My point is that for the lamp in the corner of my living room to provide light, countless men and women (my neighbors around the world, whom I do not even know) have to do their part. Just like that, each of us is "the light of the world." When we are connected with each other through God, our lights shine brighter and further.

Jesus came to dwell among us to help each of our lights shine brighter.

Loving and Gracious God! I pray that with every day that I live I love you more, see you better and clearer, and follow you closer. Amen.

"While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she [Mary] gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them" (Luke 2:6-7)

"Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord..." (Colossians 3:23) "Serve the LORD with gladness" (Psalm 100:2)

Jesus was born 2000 years ago in a tiny village, in the insignificant province of Judea on the outskirts of the Roman Empire. Most of the world was oblivious to the outcome of Jesus' birth, life, ministry, death on the Cross, and of course, the Resurrection that followed with the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.

None of us living in 2023 were privileged to be at Bethlehem at the time of Jesus' birth. All of us ARE privileged to re-visit the events of that night and to remember Jesus' impact on our personal lives.

In Jesus' name, Amen.




